Good Friday

In a world that moves at a speed previous generations could hardly comprehend, where notifications never stop, social media consumes, news is 24 hours and our life often feels like an endless to-do list, Good Friday can feel like just another day. In fact if we're honest to most people it is just that, another day. But what is Good Friday really all about?

At its core, Good Friday is about a man that died it's that simple. The events of that day are wrapped up in words such as sacrifice, love and redemption. For many the idea of sacrifice can feel outdated or irrelevant. We live in a time where 'it's me first' and for many young people, friendships are born on a screen, food is delivered and family? Well, mum and dad often live different houses.

But, why does Good Friday still matter in 2025? It matters because its core message is about pain, loss but ultimately hope wrapped up in a package of love.
