

As a family of believers, we aim to bring the message of Jesus to our community in a relevant, meaningful and friendly way, building bridges of faith and hope on the journey of life.



Honestly, why do we doubt Him?

### Scape Nature Group

Nature is struggling, and the world doesn't seem to be listening to what nature has to say. Rather than thinking there's nothing we can do, we are doing what we can in our small way to help our local wildlife and make the village more attractive for everyone.

We would love to see the village come together for wildlife, old and young everyone is welcome to get involved. It's a great way to improve your wellbeing and get to know your neighbours and do your bit to help nature recover. Let's get our village buzzing again.

**How it all started**: Mary and Glen of Urban Tree Huggers Tree Planting Group, have been planting trees for about five years now but the tree planting season is from October until March so we wanted to do something to help nature and the environment during the summer months.

Our first attempt was a 'Get Scape buzzing', idea, in 2024 where we intended to get the villagers involved in growing wildflowers and pollinator friendly perennials and setting up a plant swop. After chatting to a few of the locals, most seemed too busy and we struggled to get much interest. However we continued growing pollinator friendly plants which we distributed to four local schools.

Fast forward to this year when we planted approximately 300 tree saplings at Scapegoat Hill junior school and got chatting to Claire Lodge and Jo Baxter, from Scapegoat Hill Junior and infants school, who seemed very keen to get involved. After our initial meeting Scape Nature Group was formed. We then chatted to Simon, a deacon of Scape Baptist Church, who helped us with the tree planting and offered the church as a venue for a Wildlife gardening talk

by Jo Rawson from The Yorkshire Wildlife Trust, which turned out to be a very successful evening.

Our first project as Scape Nature group was the Scape House pub car park, planting wildflower plants and seeds and a couple of trees and trying to get rid of the docks and mugwort that had taken control. It's looking much better but it's an ongoing project that we will have to keep working on. Now we have new tenants in the pub we're hoping to get them involved as well.

Our next project is to plant a wildlife friendly hedgerow in the graveyard, with hawthorn, hazel rowan and dog rose, and also a strip of wildflowers at the side of the hedgerow.

We want to provide a year round source of food for pollinators and create a more natural environment for birds and other visiting wildlife.

Nature has been degraded to such an extent that our country is one of the most nature depleted countries in the world with one in six species at risk of being lost from Great Britain

Bees, other pollinators, and wildlife needs our help. Pollinators like bees are one of the species in decline and struggling because of habitat loss due to increased urbanisation and industry, the intensification of agriculture, the heavy use of pesticides and herbicides and loss of hedgerows and wildflower meadows.





However, Britain has 22 million gardens.

If everyone in Britain planted nectar and pollen rich flowering plants in their gardens and provided refuges by creating and protecting potential nesting sites, we could help our wildlife recover.

Following a recent rise in thefts of Fiat 500s – particularly in areas of Huddersfield and Kirklees rural, please find some crime prevention tips to protect your vehicle:

#### 1. Physical Security Devices

Steering wheel locks, pedal boxes, slam locks and gearstick locks are highly recommended. Choose models that are Sold Secure or Thatcham-approved.

Driveway posts and bollards can deter theft from private property.

OBD port locks help prevent thieves from reprogramming keys via the car's diagnostic ports.

### 2. Keyless Entry Protection

Fiat 500s with keyless entry are vulnerable to relay attacks. Use a Faraday pouch or a metal box to block signals.

Keep keys away from doors and windows to prevent 'fishing' thefts through letterboxes.

#### 3. Tracking and recovery

Install a GPS tracker or use Airtags hidden in the vehicle to aid recovery if stolen. Consider a Thatcham-rated alarm system with immobilisation and motion sensors.

### 4. Parking Advice

Park in well-lit, visible, and CCTV monitored areas.

If possible park your car inside a garage or on a driveway with a closable/lockable gate.

Use Park Mark-accredited car parks for added security.

#### 5. General Best Practices

Always double-check that your car is locked – don't rely solely on the key fob.

Never leave the car running unattended, especially during winter defrosting, or when nipping into a shop/paying for fuel.

Remove valuables and electronics like sat-navs and infotainment systems.
