As a family of believers, we aim to bring the message of Jesus to our community in a relevant, meaningful and friendly way, building bridges of faith and hope on the journey of life.



Scape Nature Group—From Christmas Carols to Crisis Help our feathered friends this winter

Famously mentioned in the classic Christmas carol, *The Twelve Days of Christmas*, turtle doves are a cherished symbol of the Christmas season. Whilst once a common sight between the months of April and September, sadly, the turtle dove is becoming increasingly elusive. As the UK's fastest declining bird species, the turtle dove has been listed as 'Vulnerable' on the RSPB's list of endangered



species Red List since 1996 – a position it maintains nearly 30 years later. Sadly Britain lost 99% of its population of turtle doves between 1967 and 2020. The turtle dove is just one of many iconic birds on the red list. Another is the magical swift, a bird that can close one eye and send half their brain to sleep in order to complete its epic migration every year back from Africa.

The swift appears in our skies in April, they sleep eat and even mate in flight. Swifts rarely touch the ground except to lay and hatch the next generation.



They have joined the red list of endangered species following a 58% fall in their numbers since 1995.

As well as migrating birds our native birds are also in decline with the number of birds in Britain falling by 73 million since 1970.

How you can help?

Cold winters can kill birds through starvation, so providing nutritious bird food like fat balls and mealworms can help birds survive through prolonged periods of freezing weather. Fat balls are the best thing to feed in winter because they are a high-energy, high-fat food source that helps birds survive cold temperatures when natural food is scarce. The calories provide the energy birds need to maintain their body temperature and stay active overnight. Giving birds access to a water source like a bird bath or pond will also help. In the spring plant native plants such as poppies, scabious bistorts and yarrow. These are home to the butterfly larvae that turn into caterpillars (baby bird food) essential for birds to feed their young. Providing a nest box can be a lifesaver for birds where nesting spots are in short supply. Another way to help in spring time is by ensuring they have a plentiful supply of different nesting materials, like wool, feathers, straw lichen and moss available.

What are the main drivers of population decline

The latest research shows that main driver of most bird population decline is intensive farming practices and the increased use of pesticides and fertiliser. Also habitat loss due to the destruction of hedgerows where farmland birds nest and produce their young. Land development



significantly affects Britain's native birds by destroying and fragmenting habitats. Specific impacts include the loss of breeding sites, disturbance to nesting birds, and altered food sources. While some generalist species may adapt to urban areas, many specialist species face significant threats from development.

Another factor affecting our native birds is Climate change. The earlier arrival of spring due to warmer temperatures causes a critical mismatch between the timing of bird breeding and the peak availability of their insect prey, such as caterpillars. For example, Blue Tits cannot adjust their egglaying dates early enough and may be unable to find sufficient food for their chicks, leading to lower survival rates.

Our local wildlife group Scape Nature has been busy this year trying to help our feathered friends by planting a wildlife hedge at Scape school and around the chapel, and planting wildflowers around the boundary of the Scape House pub car park. Our next project is to plant a wildlife hedge in the graveyard followed by a wild flower border in the spring time.

It is important to help native birds survive because they are crucial to the health of our ecosystems, providing essential services like **pest control**, **pollination**, **and seed dispersal**. They also serve as vital **indicators of environmental health** and contribute significantly to human wellbeing bringing joy to housebound people by providing a vital **connection to the natural world**, offering a source of relaxation, mental stimulation, and a sense of routine and purpose. The psychological benefits include reduced feelings of anxiety, depression, and loneliness.

If you're wondering what to buy your nature loving friends this Christmas, why not visit your local garden centre and check out their selection of bird feeders and bird baths and give our feathered friends a helping hand this winter.

What about the Waste?

In 1743, Sir John Ramsden introduced piped water from Folly Hall up into the Town to supply fresh water to the growing town. The supply of fresh water was a major problem but even worse was sanitation.

There was a solution to the 'family' sanitation problem, this was to dig a pit and tip the waste in. The waste dissipated in the ground and after twelve feet it was gone. This worked in a sparsely populated country prior to the Industrial Revolution but as the population grew, the towns and village population grew, sanitation became a major problem as the occupants threw their waste into the streets. This was followed by disease.

During the 1870s The Huddersfield Chronicle newspaper reported on a major outbreak of disease due to no sanitation. The Government set up a local Board of Enquiry into the High death rate in Golcar:- Measles, Scarlet Fever, Whooping Cough, Croup, Diarrhoea, Cholera, Erysipelas, Continued Fever, Typhus, Enteric Fever and Typhoid Fever. The annual death rate per thousand for the country was 5.9. In Golcar it was an alarming 35.4. The Board of Enquiry recorded a Doctor Webster. The water supply of Golcar was bad in quality and deficient in quantity in certain parts of the year. He attended 23 cases of Scarlet Fever in Golcar since July and handed a transcript from the Register of Deaths from Zymotic Disease. The report mentions sewage flowing on Ley Moor Road for 120 yards and in another part for 400 yards. Every Well and Water source was contaminated with raw sewage and children drank water from a Well near the National School where a witnesses pony refused to drink. Mr W. Shaw, JP of Dale House, reported on raw sewage flowing from Golcar plantation causing nuisance. Reservoirs were contaminated and the stench from Broadbent's mill dam was so bad in good weather that several employees had fever and one died walking home. A Mr C. F. Mallinson reported on the nuisance to the Board, there might have been minutes about drainage but only little repairs to highways. Mr Mallinson joined the Board to urge them for better drainage and better water supply - under the Nuisance Removal Act and since the adoption of the Local Government Act, there had been a Nuisance Inspector.

He had made reports to the local board, but they never took action upon them. A Mr Wheelhouse proposed examining Dr Webster who in turn reported that he kept a book and knew his cases, out of twenty four cases of Scarlet Fever, one adult and four children had died. Thirteen of the cases were in the West Ward. He caused the water from Small Lane Well and Clay Well to be analysed four years ago by his brother in law, a chemist, Mr Kirk from Derby. He found the water to be impure but did not submit the results of the analyst as he was not a Member of the Board at the time. Nothing had been done by the Local Board to remedy the existing water supply. The preservation of the existing supply of water from local springs would remedy the evils mentioned. He frequently attended patients in Longwood, Scammonden, Linthwaite, and Slaithwaite, sometimes Lindley, and during August. September and October he had not a single case of Scarlet Fever in those districts. Mr Joseph Hesselgrave, Medical Officer of Health in the Colne Valley District Sanitary Authority, said that the account of scarifine being prevalent in Golcar, he had visited the township about twenty times in the nine weeks since his appointment. He noticed the system of drainage was very bad and the water in the wells was much polluted. He had recommended to the board to pipe the water and had sent to the Authority three written reports. In further cross examinations, the Witness said that when the Local Board thought of obtaining a separate water supply for themselves, they received a notification from the Huddersfield Corporation that they would oppose their doing so. The Huddersfield Waterworks Act empowers the Corporation to supply Golcar with water if required, but at a one fourth higher rate than the people of Huddersfield. All was not lost as a deputation from inhabitants of Scapegoat Hill reported to the Board of Enquiry.





The Season of Advent

I'm sure we are all looking forward to chocolates behind our advent calendars from the beginning of December but lets pause a moment to consider the deeper meaning of advent.

Advent is a four-week season dedicated to reflective preparation for the arrival, "advent", of Jesus Christ's Nativity at Christmas time as well and Christ's expected return in

the Second Coming. During this important event on the church calendar, each week of Advent focuses on a different theme - hope, peace, joy, and love. Christians from all denominations and backgrounds celebrate Advent in different ways but all focus on the anticipation of waiting for the arrival of Jesus.

First Sunday of Advent - November 30th - HOPE

Second Sunday of Advent - December 7th - PEACE

Third Sunday of Advent - December 14th - JOY

Fourth Sunday of Advent - December 21st - LOVE

Lighting candles on an Advent wreath is a common practice. The wreath typically has four candles, each representing one of the four weeks of Advent. A new candle is lit on each Sunday leading up to Christmas. A centre candle representing Jesus birth is lit on Christmas Day

BE CAREFUL BUYING ONLINE OVER CHRISTMAS

Be careful how you pay

If you're asked to transfer money straight into someone's bank account, STOP! That's the riskiest way to pay online because, if it's a scam, your money is almost impossible to get back. Use a credit card whenever possible, as it gives you stringer protection.

Check Websites properly

Scammers put serious effort into creating fake online

shops and social media profiles that look just like the real deal. Don't click on links from emails, texts or posts—type the web address into your brownser yourself. Check the spelling carefully: even a tiny difference can mean a bogus site. Tools like www.getsafeonline.org or checkawebsite can help you confirm if a site is genuine.

Watch out for suspicious adverts

Just because something is advertised online, it doesn't mean it's safe. Unrealistically low prices are a classic red flag, but fraudsters also list items at normal prices to avoid suspicion. Never send money upfront for goods you haven't physically seen.

Don't click blindly

Unexpected links or attachments in emails, texts or social media messages are one of the most common ways criminals trick people. If you're unsure, you can upload suspicious messages and sites via www.getsafeonline.org/asksilver

Look for secure payment pages

A legitimate checkout page should begin with https:// and show a padlock icon in the address bar. This means your data is encrypted—but remember, encryption doesn't guarantee the site itself is genuine. Scammers can still create secure websites.

Avoid counterfeits

Cheap knock-off goods don't just hurry the original brands—they can be poor quality and sometime dangerous. Always buy from trusted retailers if you want the real thing.

Be wary of 'free trials'

Those 'try it for free' or 'just pay postage' offers can hide expensive subscriptions. These recurring charges can be difficult to cancel, especially with products like slimming pills or unlicensed health remedies. Always read reviews and trms before signing up.

Delivery scam alerts

Fraudsters posing as delivery companies send fake texts and emails saying you owe a small fee before your parcel can be released or re-delivered. Keep track of what you've bought, and which courier is actually being used so you can spot fakes.
